

JAMES A. BURRILL

In Memoriam

The dwindling number of Angle graduates lost another member October 11th, 1953. James A. Burrill, one of Chicago's pioneer orthodontists, passed away that day at the age of seventysix. For many years a member of the Midwestern Component, Jim enjoyed a full and complete life of service to his profession.

He was graduated from the University of Michigan in 1905 and from the Angle School of Orthodontia in the same year. From 1907 until 1913 he was a member of the faculty of the University of Illinois. An active worker in orthodontics, Dr. Burrill was a charter member and past president of

the Chicago Association of Orthodontists; he was prominent in the American Association of Orthodontists and a past president of the organization; another position he filled was that of a director of the American Board of Orthodontics.

Dr. Burrill was married to Miss Bertha Youngs in 1906. He leaves his widow, one daughter, and three sons, two of whom are dentists. Survivors also are the younger members of the Midwestern Component who will long remember Jims' outstanding clinics of cases thirty and thirty-five years after treatment.
