In Memoriam

His devotion to orthodontics and unselfish contributions to the dental profession earned the commanding respect of his colleagues for William S. Smith who died last August at the age of sixty-three.

Dr. Smith was reared and educated in San Francisco, graduating from the College of Dentistry of the University of California in 1928 and from the specialty course in 1931.

In addition to his private practice in Richmond he served for many years as a sectional editor of the *American Journal of Orthodontics* and at the time of his death was the president of the American Association of Orthodontists. He was a member of the Northern California Component of the

Edward H. Angle Society of Orthodontists and a former Executive Committee member from that group.

During Bill's service to dentistry he was president of the California State Dental Association and secretary of the California Dental Service Corporation. He was a diplomate of the American Board of Orthodontics, a Fellow of the American College of Dentistry and a member of Omicron Kappa Upsilon.

His friends, and especially the members of the Northern California Component of the Angle Society, will cherish their memories of Bill.

He is survived by his wife Dorothy, two daughters, Beverley and Penny, and a brother, Robeson.
