In Memoriam

WILLIAM M. TWEED 1906-1975

Memorial services for William M. "Ted" Tweed were held in Tucson, Arizona on July 14, 1975.

An outstanding and enthusiastic teacher of clinical orthodontics, Ted was the founder and guiding hand of the Arizona Orthodontic Society. He influenced the lives of many men in the profession and was an inspirational force both in Arizona and in Mexico.

Dr. Tweed was graduated from the University of Southern California in 1930. He practiced general dentistry in Arizona and California for two years, then entered the University of California where he completed his orthodontic training in 1934.

He practiced orthodontics in Phoenix until the beginning of World War II when he volunteered for military service. His duty stations included two

years at airbases in England, France and Germany. After the war he returned to the practice of orthodontics in Tucson instead of Phoenix.

Ted was a diplomate of the American Board of Orthodontics, a Fellow of the American College of Dentistry and a past-president of the Charles H. Tweed Foundation. He was also a member of the Edward H. Angle Society, the Pacific Coast Society of Orthodontists, and an honorary member of both the Cuban and the Mexican Orthodontic Associations.

Dr. Tweed, an acknowledged expert in his hobby of salt water fishing and boating, was stricken while on vacation at San Carlos Bay in Mexico. He is survived by two daughters, one son, and two grandchildren.
